

A hearty welcome to all present and thank you very much for all who have given up their time to attend the 94th Annual general Meeting of the Pretoria Amateur Radio Club.

Thank you very much to Pretoria Amateur Radio Club- and Committee Members for your support the past two years in my role as Chairman. This has been an enriching and fulfilling time to serve four years in total over the past six years. The two years serving during the pandemic was particularly difficult when PARC lost a number of members. However, the human spirit has prevailed and the will to survive has been demonstrated by those who are still with us. We look with great anticipation forward to the future with the 95th anniversary of PARC approaching and the celebration planned in 2025. PARC has volunteered to host the 100th anniversary of the South African Radio League and

both events will take place on the 16th to the 18th of May 2025. Going towards this exciting time ahead it is therefore a tremendous honour and pleasure to present my Chairman's report to you today.

<u>Silent Keys</u>: Last year we remembered with sadness and paid tribute to PARC members Henk Stuivenberg ZS6CS / PA0STU, Menno Havelaar ZS6AGC, Johnny Scott ZS6JSS, Johannes (Attie) Reyneke ZS6REY and Hans Kappetijn ZS6KR who passed away. Fortunately this year, we had no members who passed away.

<u>Club Membership</u>: PARC membership is currently at 132 active, and 8 non-active members, which is an increase of <1% compared to the membership number during 2023. It is a concern that amateur radio is not growing under our youth as we have wanted it to. However, we still sincerely thank our Members for their support and loyalty.

I hereby wish to thank the following Committee- and Club Members according to the different categories they have contributed to for the Pretoria Amateur Radio Club:

<u>Finances</u>: PARC sincerely thanks Graham Reid ZS6GJR for his hard work and dedication with his accurate and meticulous handling of the financial matters of the Club. His monthly updates of transactions and bank balances to the Committee is sincerely appreciated.

<u>Secretarial</u>: For the past four years, Irene Myburgh ZS6IEA has served with distinction on the PARC Committee as Secretary. Her accurate record taking and swift production of minutes of committee meetings has set a high standard. We sincerely thank Irene for her excellent service towards the Club.

<u>PARC Website</u>: Graham Reid ZS6GJR is sincerely thanked for the maintenance and administration of the PARC website, as well as liaising with the host of the domain when problems and issues arise.

Swop Shop: Alméro Du Pisani ZS6LDP has taken over Swop Shop since the passing of Hans ZS6KR handling call-ins every Sunday morning after bulletins. Tjerk Lammers ZS6P / ZS1J handles this function on the PARC website. Our sincere appreciation to Alméro and Tjerk for your efforts and dedication.

<u>Bulletins</u>: Sunday morning bulletins are such an essential medium of Club to Member communications, relaying valuable information and news regarding Club and SARL matters. The number of Members involved is quite extensive, and we would sincerely like to thank the following people for their appreciated efforts:

<u>Alméro DuPisani ZS6LDP</u>: Playback of Afrikaans and English SARL bulletins and report back on Echolink listeners. Regular hosting of PARC bulletins.

<u>Johan Lehman ZS6JPL</u>: Providing and maintaining the Echolink service and repeater to PARC. Periodic HF relay of bulletins.

Johan de Bruyn ZS6JHB: Editing of SARL bulletins and regular hosting of PARC bulletins.

Irene Myburgh ZS6IEA: Reading and recording of Afrikaans SARL bulletins.

<u>Pierre ZS6PS and Corlie ZS6CHS Smit</u>, for the handling of HF call-ins on Sunday mornings and maintaining a database on the demographic distribution of listeners.

Louis de Wet ZS6SK: Regular hosting of PARC bulletins and repeats on Monday evenings.

Lastly, the past three years with access to PARC bulletins by means of Echolink, the number of bulletin listeners has increased significantly. This includes listeners from Kwazulu-Natal, Free State,

Eastern, Southern and Western Cape, Mozambique, The DRC, Mali, The Netherlands, New Zealand, Australia, Switzerland and others.

Repeaters: Johan de Bruyn ZS6JHB and Pieter Myburgh ZS6PAM for keeping the repeater network operational and dealing with numerous issues such as burglaries and power outages at the sites. Johan is in regular communication with Jasco High Sites communication who maintains the repeater sites. Last year PARC members were encouraged to join a repeater maintenance team which is going to be established in 2025 to ensure better maintenance on transceivers, feedlines and antennas. 





Radio Interference By Frank Schneider - ZS6GE

Over the last two years or so, the background noise on the HF bands was getting stronger and stronger. Then, about six months ago, the S meter levels went up to S8 to S9. Now my S meter is calibrated to 50uV, quite a strong signal for S9. I am using only 14MHz up. All the bands had this broadband noise.



So, for interest's sake, I assembled a so-called noise eliminator kit, which I have bought long time ago. I have a beam and a vertical. Using the vertical as a secondary antenna, I could indeed reduce the interference somewhat. This implies, that the interference is local. I also noticed that the noise died down considerably, when the sun set.





Conclusion: It must be a solar installation. But which one? For a long time, I was the only one with an installation in the neighbourhood, but now every second house has one. With the beam I found the noise coming from a north westerly direction.


So, I decided to do something about it. Leon, ZS1MM made me a small 14MHz AM receiver. I put it in a box and made a wideband untuned loop for it. Rectifying the audio gives me a meter reading.



I found that this arrangement was not sensitive enough. So, I bought a SDR receiver and built a tuned loop for it.









Now I could receive the noise and get directivity. So, I put SDR receiver and a laptop into the car, headphones on my head and the loop in my hand outside the car window.


Started circling the neighbourhood and got some very strange looks. When I found a maximum, I walked around, taking bearings only three houses down the road. The owner was quite helpful, letting me onto the property and take bearings. Those pointed to a house round the block. Once there, the signal got very strong. Now I used the wide band loop. Much easier to carry around. With it I found the exact house. The owner was not impressed and very defensive. It took a few days before I was allowed onto the property. If one is this close, everything seems to radiate. Eventually, I was convinced the noise came from the solar inverter in the roof. It is a version, which is essentially a glorified Voltage regulator, which feeds DC to a dual heating element of the geyser, which can also use AC. I was not allowed to touch anything, nor did I want to. A definite no-no. The owner had no idea, how the system works, nor how to switch it off. So, the Installer had to be called, for which the owner paid...

The installer climbed into the roof and switched the inverter off. Bliss! Silence! Now what? I ordered 12 clip-on ferrites, for which I paid.



The installer had to come again and fit them to every cable going into the inverter. As somewhat expected, it didn't help too much. About half a S point on 20m, 1.5 S points on 10. From the Installer I got the name of the supplier, a company in Cape Town. As luck would have it, one of the staff was an amateur and knew, what I was talking about. He talked to the boss, and I must say, they were very helpful and eventually installed a new inverter. All was quiet...Looks like something in the original box had gone haywire.

However, there was a problem...., because now I could see more interference, from a different direction, that was previously masked.



This, too, disappeared at night. So, the same exercise again, going for a hunt. I was pretty sure I found another neighbour causing the problem. Only finding somebody at home during daytime was tricky. Eventually I managed and found a good looking installation, that radiated like crazy. It is not the owners property, he rents it. This helps, because it was not really his responsibility. Many e-mails and six weeks later, the inverter was replaced. Bliss! This interference was gone!

However, there is a problem...., because now I could see similar interference, albeit a bit weaker, that was previously masked. See the small spikes between the large ones.

So, I will have to go through the same exercise again... I also hear a wideband buzzing sound, day and night. Now that will have to wait a bit...

Update: I found the house where the interference comes from. No to find the owner and explain...

The Importance of the Phonetic Alphabet

The phonetic alphabet, specifically the NATO or International Telecommunication Union (ITU) standard, plays a critical role in ensuring clear and accurate communication, particularly in South Africa's diverse linguistic landscape and during long-distance (DX) contacts. This article explores why the correct use of the phonetic alphabet is essential for ham radio operators in South Africa and when engaging in DX communication.

The Role of the Phonetic Alphabet in Ham Radio

The phonetic alphabet assigns distinct words to each letter of the alphabet (e.g., Alpha for A, Bravo for B, Zulu for Z) to avoid confusion caused by similar-sounding letters like B, D, and P. In ham radio, where operators rely on voice communication over potentially noisy or weak signals, the phonetic alphabet ensures that critical information—such as call signs, locations, or emergency messages—is transmitted accurately. This is especially important in South Africa, where operators communicate across vast distances and diverse environments, and during DX contacts that span continents and languages.

South Africa's geography poses challenges for radio communication. From urban centres like Johannesburg to remote rural areas, operators face issues like signal fading, interference, and atmospheric noise, particularly on HF bands used for long-distance communication. The phonetic alphabet helps overcome these obstacles by providing clear, universally recognized code words that cut through static and distortion. For instance, saying "Sierra" for S instead of the letter itself ensures clarity, even in poor signal conditions.

In emergency situations, such as natural disasters like floods or wildfires, which are not uncommon in South Africa, ham radio operators often provide critical communication support when conventional systems fail. The phonetic alphabet is vital for relaying precise information, such as coordinates or medical details, to emergency services or other operators. Miscommunication in these scenarios could have serious consequences, making adherence to the standard phonetic alphabet a matter of life and death.

The Importance of Phonetics in DX Communication

DX communication, where operators connect with stations outside their country, is a hallmark of ham radio and particularly popular in South Africa due to its strategic location for reaching Europe, the Americas, and Oceania. However, DX contacts often involve weak signals, atmospheric interference, and language barriers, as operators may not share a common native language. The NATO phonetic alphabet, recognized globally by ham radio operators, military, and aviation communities, is essential for overcoming these challenges.

For example, a South African operator with the call sign ZS6XYZ might use "Zulu Sierra Six X-ray Yankee Zulu" to ensure their call sign is understood by a station in Japan or Brazil. Without phonetics, letters like Z and S could be misheard, leading to errors in logging or missed connections. DX communication often occurs in competitive settings, such as contests, where operators exchange information rapidly. Using standard phonetics like "Kilo" instead of non-standard terms like "Kilowatt" ensures efficiency and avoids confusion, especially when the receiving operator's first language isn't English.

Moreover, DX contacts frequently involve operators with varying levels of English proficiency. The NATO phonetic alphabet's universal adoption minimizes errors caused by unfamiliar accents or

pronunciations. For instance, a South African operator contacting a station in Eastern Europe might struggle with mutual intelligibility, but using "Alpha" instead of "A" ensures the letter is understood regardless of linguistic differences.

Common Mistakes and Best Practices

Despite its importance, some ham radio operators in South Africa and beyond deviate from the NATO phonetic alphabet, often for creative or humorous reasons. For example, an operator might use "Zesty Zebra" instead of "Zulu" for Z, thinking it's memorable or fun. However, this undermines the alphabet's universal recognition, especially in DX communication where non-standard phonetics can confuse operators unfamiliar with the substituted words.

To maximize clarity, operators should:

- Use the NATO/ITU phonetic alphabet exclusively for call signs, locations, and critical information.
- Pronounce words clearly and slowly, especially in noisy or weak signal conditions.
- Practice regularly to build familiarity with the alphabet, leveraging the brain's phonemic restoration ability to recognize familiar words even in poor conditions.

Cultural and Practical Considerations in South Africa

South Africa's ham radio community is vibrant but relatively small compared to global counterparts, making it essential for operators to adhere to international standards to integrate seamlessly into the global ham radio network. By consistently using the NATO phonetic alphabet, South African operators uphold professionalism and foster a sense of unity with the worldwide ham radio community. This is particularly important during international events like the CQ Worldwide DX Contest, where South African stations are highly sought after due to their unique ZS prefix.

Furthermore, South African operators often serve as ambassadors for the country in DX communication. Clear use of the phonetic alphabet enhances their reputation for reliability and professionalism, encouraging more international contacts. For new operators, mastering the phonetic alphabet is a practical step toward building confidence and competence in both local and DX operations.

Conclusion

The correct use of the NATO phonetic alphabet is indispensable for ham radio operators in South Africa and during DX communication. In a country with diverse languages and challenging radio conditions, the alphabet ensures clarity and accuracy, especially in emergencies.

For DX contacts, it bridges language barriers and overcomes weak signals, enabling South African operators to connect with the world. By adhering to the standard phonetic alphabet, avoiding non-standard substitutions, and practicing clear pronunciation, operators can enhance communication efficiency, uphold professionalism, and contribute to the global ham radio community's seamless operation. Whether relaying a call sign in Johannesburg or connecting with a station in Tokyo, the phonetic alphabet is a lifeline for clear, reliable communication.

Amateur Radio Licensing Update During US Government Shutdown

The ARRL Volunteer Examiner Coordinator, ARRL VEC, wants members to know that we are closely following the impact of the US Government shutdown on licensing for the Amateur Radio Service.

The government shutdown began at 12:01 Eastern time on Wednesday, October 1, 2025, when Congress had not passed an appropriations bill or other plan to keep the government funded for the new fiscal year (begins October 1).

The Federal Communications Commission, which issues Amateur Radio Service licenses, issued a Public Notice on Tuesday, September 30, indicating that it would suspend most operations following a shutdown. "Aside from a few emergency and auction filing systems, all other Commission electronic filing systems will be unavailable to the public until normal agency operations resume," said the FCC Notice.

ARRL VEC Manager Maria Somma, AB1FM, said the FCC systems appeared to go off-line around 1 PM Eastern time, and are redirecting to the Public Notice. This means the FCC will not be processing any amateur radio license applications during the shutdown, which includes individual, club, and exam session (new and upgrade) applications.


"But ARRL Volunteer Examiners should continue giving exam sessions," said Somma. "Keep doing what you're doing. Keep serving new and upgrade candidates for amateur radio licenses." Somma also urged that Volunteer Examiners continue to promptly forward session results from their exams to the ARRL VEC.


"Please do not hold your session results. Send your sessions to us, and ARRL VEC will continue to queue all applications as they are received. Once the federal government reopens, ARRL VEC will promptly resume submitting applications to the FCC for processing. So, keep sending sessions to the ARRL VEC."


The FCC Notice indicates that the CORES registration system will remain available to the public and will not be affected by the shutdown. Exam candidates can still register in CORES and be assigned an FCC Registration Number (FRN) at https://apps.fcc.gov/cores/userLogin.do. The FCC's Universal Licensing System (ULS) databases are currently unavailable to the public. ULS and related systems (like the License Manager, License Search, Application Search, etc.) are not accessible during the shutdown. Users cannot file applications with the FCC, or access license data, including address information.














Duct Tape and Chocolate—The Shack Survival Kit


